MAYOR'S UPDATE

VILLAGE'S FLOOD CONTROL GRANT PROGRAM A SUCCESS! OWNER OCCUPIED 2 AND 3 FLATS NOW ELIGIBLE

As many of you are aware the Village started a flood control grant program this past May that gives a grant of up to \$1,000.00 to single family homeowners to help pay for the installation of a sewer check valve for their home. This was an effort by the Village to offer direct assistance to residents dealing with flood problems. I am happy to report that this program has been well received and to date more than two dozen residents have taken advantage of the program.

Installing a sewer check valve is a solid and easy way to protect your home from sewer backups due to severe storms that have plagued the Chicago area in recent years. I am glad that many residents who were most affected by the recent storms now have some measure of protection against future basement flooding. A "check valve" is a simple plumbing device, with a drop down flap, that when working properly should prevent sewer water from backing up into your basement. Keep in mind that a check valve is best installed by a licensed plumber and that you will need to obtain a Village building permit (the normal fee is waived) before work can begin. Further details about the program can be obtained by picking up an application at the Village Hall or Community Development Department.

Given the program's success the Village Board and I recently approved an eligibility expansion for the program to include owner occupied two and three flats. Previously the program had been available only to single family owner occupied homes, but expanding it to include

additional residents made sense. Please feel free to call the Village Hall if you have any questions or concerns about this program.

On an unrelated note I wanted to extend my personal thanks to the volunteers, restaurants, classic car owners, and businesses that helped make our recent Car Show & Family Day such a big success. The event was well attended and offered fun activities for adults and children alike. Numerous local eateries participated and offered a wide variety of tasty treats. I hope that many of you were able to get out and enjoy this wonderful community event and spend some quality time with your family. I am already looking forward to next year's show!

Lastly I want to announce that the Village is launching a new program aimed at helping seniors by shoveling snow from their front walk and sidewalk. This is an expansion of the successful existing program which helps seniors by snow plowing their driveway at an affordable rate. CRYSTAL CREEK UPDATE

The Village is happy to report that progress continues to be made on the next phase of the Crystal Creek flood control project. Necessary permits have now been approved and signed by the Army Corps of Engineers (ACE) along with the Village of Schiller Park and the Village of Franklin Park. The Village Board approved a contract on September 22nd to move the last remaining Village utility pipe out of the way to make room for the additional culvert which will be installed under Irving Park Road. This work should be underway by the time you receive this newsletter.

The Village is also working with the more than twelve (12) utilities in the area to move their equipment out of the way. These are mainly

fiber optic companies, but the primary one is Commonwealth Edison, which needs to move its poles out of the way, primarily in the area between Hirschberg/Sunnyside and Emerson Streets. The Village expects this work to be underway by early winter. Other utilities using these poles (such as phone and cable) will also have to move their lines. The Village continues to work with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR), the state agency responsible for planning and construction of this project, to bring construction forward as soon as possible.

Though the actual construction of this phase of the project will stop at the Tollway property south of Irving Park Road, it is important to remember that the completion of this phase will

benefit all areas near the Creek, including the area south of Irving Park Road. This is because storm water will be able to move out of this area, under Irving Park Road, and eventually to the Des Plaines River, faster than in the past. This will allow the area south of Irving Park to drain much more quickly.

VILLAGE ENHANCES EMERGENCY FLOOD CONTROL PREPARATIONS

In order to ensure a more rapid availability of sandbags for emergency use the Village recently installed a small shed stocked with sandbags at the water tower (4101 Scott Street). This location will be opened up for public use in the event of an emergency so residents in that part of the community will have quicker access to sandbags. The Village now has three (3) fixed locations for pre-prepared sand bags: (1) Fire Station #2 on 25th Avenue, (2) the Street Garage (located behind the Village Hall) on Irving Park Road, and (3) the new shed at the water tower on Scott Street.

The Village has also prepared two trailers full of pre-prepared sandbags that can be driven to the areas of the Village in the most need. These trailers further improve our ability to respond to residents in the event of a flood emergency. The Village is committed to providing a rapid and effective response to a flood emergency and believes these measures will help accomplish that goal.

VILLAGE SEWER MAINTENANCE & CLEANING PROGRAM

It is good practice to have a program for cleaning and televising a sewer system to ensure the capacity of the sewers are maintained and to identify any needed repairs. The goal is to keep the system in good working order and operating as close to peak efficiency as possible.

The Village has a program in place to clean and televise the sanitary and storm sewer in the entire Village every five (5) years. The Village recently completed cleaning and televising the sanitary and storm sewers in the section of the Village between Irving Park Road and Lawrence Avenue from the railroad tracks east to Des Plaines River Road. Another section of the Village's sewers is due to be cleaned and televised this fall as the Village proceeds with the next stage of the program.

In this recently completed area, the systems were found to be in good condition, with only 153 feet of non-emergency repairs needed out of a total of 20,000 feet inspected. The Village recently awarded a contract to perform the minor repairs on the sewer system that were discovered.

THE 2010 US CENSUS IS A FEW MONTHS AWAY!

The census is a count of everyone living in the United States every 10 years. The U.S. Constitution has required it every ten years since 1790. The next census is in the spring of 2010.

WHY IS THE CENSUS IMPORTANT?

- Census data is used to distribute Congressional seats.
- Census information is what the federal government uses to make decisions about what community services to provide, construction projects to fund, etc. They distribute \$300 billion in federal funds to local and state governments each year.
- The state distributes gas tax funds based on census population. This money goes directly into road construction right here in Schiller Park.
- Businesses make marketing decisions based on population data. If you want a certain store to locate in or near Schiller Park, they will look at census info to make that decision.

WHAT DO YOU NEED TO KNOW?

- A census response takes less than 10 minutes to complete.
- Federal law protects the personal information you share during the census. The information you give is strictly confidential.

CENSUS MYTHS:

- I will start receiving junk mail.
FACT: The census is prohibited by federal law from giving out any personal information to any business.
- I will get audited by the IRS.
FACT: The census is prohibited by federal law from giving out any personal information to any other government agency. Not even the IRS, FBI, CIA, Homeland Security, or any court can access your information.
- It doesn't really matter, I'm just one person, what's the big deal if I'm not counted?
FACT: Census data is used to apportion state and federal tax money, determine voting districts, etc. If you value good roads, good public services, and representation in the state legislature and congress, then responding to the census is a way to do your part!

WHAT DO WE NEED TO DO?

When you receive your census packet in the mail, simply fill it out and return! If you do not receive one, the census will set up stations in local offices (library, community center, etc.) for you to visit and respond on-the-spot.

COMMUNITY POLICING CORNER - HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

The Police Department and Community Police Officer Frank DeSimone want parents and children to be safe this Halloween and offer the following safety tips for the spooky holiday:

TRICK-OR-TREATERS

- Carry a flashlight
- Walk, don't run
- Stay on sidewalks
- Obey traffic signals
- Stay in familiar neighborhoods
- Don't cut across yards or driveways
- Wear a watch you can read in the dark
- Make sure your costume doesn't drag on the ground
- Shoes should fit and be comfortable (even if they don't go with your costume)
- Avoid wearing masks when walking from house to house
- Carry only flexible knives, swords, or other props
- Wear clothing with reflective markings or tape

- Approach only houses that are lit
- Stay away from and don't pet animals you don't know

PARENTS

- Make your children have dinner before setting out
- Ideally children of any age should be accompanied by an adult
- If your children go on their own, be sure they wear a watch (preferably one that can be read in the dark)
- If you buy a costume, look for one made of flame retardant material
- Children on their own should know how to reach you and when to be home
- You should know where they're going
- Tell children to bring their candy home to be inspected before they eat any of it - you should look over the wrapping and toss out anything that looks suspicious

HOMEOWNERS

- Make sure your yard is clear of such things as ladders, hoses, dog leashes, and flower pots that can trip up the young ones
- Pets can get frightened on Halloween - secure them to protect them from cars and to prevent them from inadvertently biting a trick-or-treater
- Battery powered pumpkin candles are preferable to a real flame
- If you do use candles, place the pumpkin well away from where trick-or-treaters will be walking or standing
- Make sure paper or cloth yard decorations won't be blown into a flaming candle
- Healthy food alternatives for trick-or-treaters include packages of low fat crackers, packaged fruit rolls, mini-boxes of raisins, and single serve packets of low-fat popcorn that can be microwaved later
- Non-food treats: plastic rings, pencils, stickers, erasers, and coins

FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

F.I.R.E. (FIRE INFORMATION REACHES EVERYONE)

The Schiller Park Fire Department is pioneering a new Public Education program designed to reach all age groups. The program, Fire Information Reaches Everyone (F.I.R.E.), was conceived by Cmdr. Chiodo to be an educational tool for children, adults, residents and businesses.

The program has been launched at both Washington School and St. Maria Goretti where firefighters are assigned to the classroom and adopt a class. They visit the school children at least once a month teaching different safety messages. The firefighters also participate in the school activities by attending assemblies, lunches, field trips and class parties.

As part of the program all participants will receive a t-shirt with the new F.I.R.E. logo.

SNOW REMOVAL

Snow is plowed from heavily traveled arterial streets before it is removed from less traveled side streets. Parked cars must be removed from Village streets after a three-inch snowfall. Without parked cars, snow can be removed from curb- to- curb to allow proper drainage of snowmelt and to prevent ice patches. The parking ban remains in effect until streets and curbs have been completely cleared of snow. The police will ticket vehicles in violation of the parking ban, except on certain streets where parking is allowed after a snowfall.

Do your part to keep our streets clear of snow and ice. Do not shovel or blow snow onto Village streets. Snow deposited on the streets interferes with efficient snow plowing operations, impedes traffic flow and creates a danger to motorists. The danger is created when the deposited snow is compacted and hardens into ice patches.

If you have a fire hydrant in front or near your home or business, help the Fire Department by making sure the hydrant is clear of ice and snow at all times and is able to be seen from the street.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TELEVISION SATELLITE DISH PLACEMENT

With the growth of popularity of satellite television in the last few years the placement of satellite dishes required for viewing has become an issue. These small dishes usually require a clear view of the southern sky - usually toward the southwest. If your house faces south, you might be tempted to install your dish in the front yard, on the front porch, or on the front of the roof.

However the Village Code prohibits satellite dish placement in all these areas. Most dishes can be installed with the base of the dish on the north side of the roof with just the dish itself peeking over the top of your roof. Please be aware that if you place a dish in violation of the Village Code you will be asked to move it. If you have any questions, please call Community Development (671-8555) before you install your dish.

RECREATION PROGRAMS OFFERED FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES

The Village of Schiller Park is a member of Northeast DuPage Special Recreation Association (NEDSRA), a 501(c)(3) agency, providing recreation opportunities to both children and adults with disabilities. NEDSRA is a cooperative of eight park districts and three village recreation departments in northeast DuPage County and west Cook County, formed in 1976 to combine resources and avoid duplication in providing recreation programs and services for people with disabilities. NEDSRA's mission is to serve as an integral partner with its member park districts and villages to positively impact people with disabilities through diverse recreation opportunities and community services. NEDSRA's primary purpose is to improve the quality of life for individuals with disabilities in our member communities by providing recreation services comparable to those available to people without disabilities, thereby helping individuals reach their highest level of independence.

NEDSRA has grown from serving a few hundred individuals in 1977 to serving more than 4,000 individuals each year presently. NEDSRA offers more than 800 social development, leisure education, recreation, nature and sports skills programs and services on an annual basis. Services are available for all individuals from three years of age through adulthood whose disability classifications may include, but are not limited to learning disability, behavior disorder, youth at risk, mental disability, physical disability, visual impairment, deaf and hearing impaired, multiple disability, mental illness, severe and profound mental disability, and autism.

WATER LEAK TIPS

The Village wants to advise its water customers that even a small leak in a pipe, faucet, toilet, or shower can add up to a large bill if not repaired promptly. A particularly common problem is a leak in the toilet tank that can be constantly running, but with no sound to reveal its presence. Checking your toilet for a leak is especially easy to do – you can simply add dye to the water in the tank and wait 15 minutes without using the toilet or flushing to see if the dye color migrates from the tank to the bowl. If the bowl water becomes colored then you have a leak and should get

it fixed soon. The Village has dye strips available at the Village Hall to assist you with checking your toilet or you can use simple food coloring.

Another problematic issue occurs when a resident goes on an extended vacation and leaves their water service on during their absence. If there is a leak while they are gone water will continue to flow and the resident may end up with a large bill when they return from their trip. A simple solution to this is to turn off your water service while you are away so that a small leak doesn't keep flowing during that time.

FROM THE BUILDING OFFICIAL

FALL & WINTER REMINDERS:

With summer coming to an end, we would like to remind you about certain things to do around your home to get ready for the winter months, and the heating season. Before starting your furnace, you may want to have it cleaned by a professional to make sure it is running as efficiently as possible. Check around the outside of your house to make sure there are no

gaps around windows, doors, and siding for the cold air to get inside your home. This is also a good time to test smoke and carbon monoxide detector to make sure they are functioning properly. Carbon monoxide detectors should be located within 15 feet of all sleeping areas. Smoke detectors should be located in every sleeping room along with one on every floor of your home.

Along with colder weather, come interior remodeling projects. If you are planning a remodeling project, you will want to check with the Building Department as soon as possible to see if your project will require a permit. The building permit provides the homeowner with a record of construction being done according to code. We issue two types of permits, homeowner and contractor. Homeowners performing their own work will be

required to sign a "Certificate of Responsibility". Contractors should be licensed with the Village and carry insurance. Don't be afraid to ask for the proper documentation.

If you have questions about the building permit process, feel free to contact the Building Department at (847) 671-8555. Someone will be available to assist you from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM Monday-Friday.
