MAYOR'S UPDATE

TOUGH TIMES MAKE FOR TOUGH CHOICES

As everyone out there is aware - times are tough - our country in general and the Chicago area specifically are suffering through a difficult economic crunch. While Schiller Park's financial position remains sound, and the Village is in a much better position than many of our neighboring municipalities (many of which have already been forced to lay off staff), we are starting to feel the pinch of the economic downturn. Please be assured the Village Board is committed to examining our options carefully with the goal of keeping the Village in a fiscally sound position moving forward.

As part of the Board's response to these circumstances I have directed the Village staff to take a hard look at our operations to determine where we can economize our programs and services to save money with a minimum of impact on the quality of services for our residents. Our budget preparations for the fiscal year ending 2011 (from May 1, 2010 to April 30, 2011) have begun and in this context the Board is going to face some tough choices about projects and programs. One area where a change has already been made is in the street sweeping program. The Village Board recently approved hiring an experienced private company with about a dozen sweepers to perform this service in the Village - a move that will save money and improve efficiency. Street sweeping is such an expensive program (a new sweeper costs about \$180,000 and is costly to operate and maintain) that many municipalities have begun to contract it out in recent years. More details on the new street sweeping program can be found inside this newsletter.

Another measure the Board has approved includes, for the first time in six (6) years, a modest \$5.00 increase in the cost of a vehicle sticker. It should be noted that the Village's sticker remains, at the new price of \$20.00, considerably cheaper than most communities, many of which are also raising their sticker prices because of the current economic situation. Other changes to the vehicle sticker program include improvements such as the introduction of online purchasing. Details about the changes to the vehicle sticker program can also be found inside this newsletter.

In other news, progress continues to be made on the Crystal Creek project. An update on these developments can be found inside this newsletter - but the news is positive - the project has been bid out by the State and a contract for construction should soon be awarded.

Fortunately the Village, despite the tough times, is going to be able to proceed with several projects this year. These include a dog park at the north end of the Metra Station property, the remodeling of Stalica Park (starting with improvements to the softball field this spring), and renovations to the Village Hall to provide disability access.

VILLAGE REVAMPS STREET SWEEPING PROGRAM

Starting in the spring of 2010 the Village is revamping the street sweeping program. This change is being made to save money during these difficult economic times, minimize the parking restrictions, and increase the reliability of the service. The work will now be done by a private contractor, Hoving Clean Sweep, which submitted the lowest bid in a competitive bidding process organized by the Village and received excellent references from their customers.

The current program involves sweeping the entire town each week by covering a different section on each of five (5) weekdays per week (Monday through Friday). The new schedule will streamline the process by providing for street sweeping on only two (2) days per week instead of the current five (5). The new two (2) day schedule provides for sweeping the **even numbered addresses side of each street on Monday** and **odd numbered addresses side on Tuesdays**. The various Village parking lots and alleys

will be swept on Wednesdays. Additionally a sweep of town will be done only two (2) times per month (**the 2nd and 4th Monday and the 2nd and 4th Tuesday, April through November**), with an additional winter cleanup sweep scheduled for the last week in March. In other words if your home has an even numbered address the edge of the street directly in front of your home will be swept on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of the month and the opposite side of your street will be swept on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays. Finally the sweeping hours will be expanded to 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM instead of the current 8:00 AM to 2:30 PM.

All of this means that there will be parking restrictions on Village streets only during the 2nd and 4th weeks of the month and only on Mondays and Tuesdays during those weeks. The schedule showing the sweeping dates for this coming season is shown at the right. Also to ease in the transition to the new schedule parking enforcement will be initially limited to warnings to

give residents the opportunity to adjust to the new rules.

As noted already, the sweeping will now be done by a private contractor which has successfully performed similar street sweeping work for a number of communities including Hoffman Estates, Bloomingdale, Roselle, Woodridge, Lakemoor, Itasca, and Darien. Since Hoving Clean Sweep has a number of sweepers available it can eliminate the delays and missed sweeps the Village has experienced in recent years due to mechanical difficulties with the Village sweeper. This will lead to increased reliability for the sweeping service.

The Village is happy to report that these changes will save money, streamline the sweeping schedule, improve the reliability of the service, and significantly reduce the number of days with parking restrictions. SCHILLER PARK HISTORICAL COMMISSION CELEBRATES 20 YEARS!

Anniversary Celebration Open House has been scheduled for Saturday, April 10th, 10:00 A.M. - 1:00 PM in the lower level of the Library.

In April, 1990 it became official, The Schiller Park Historical Commission was formed under the auspices of the Village of Schiller Park. Actually the gathering of local history began in 1964 when the Village celebrated its 50th Anniversary. A modest booklet was published for that event. In the years following, information continued to trickle in so that by the time we celebrated the Nations Bicentennial in 1976 a more complete book "Plow Shares to Jet Fields" had been prepared.

In 1989 Schiller Park marked its 75th Anniversary and "Reflections" was written. Then a problem developed, several boxes of priceless historical material had been accumulated with nowhere available to store and display it. A request to the Village Board resulted in the proclamation that made the Historical Commission an official Village group. The Village Library then provided us with a room, an arrangement that continues until today and that has been greatly appreciated by the Commission over the years.

The Historical Commission also offers its heartfelt thanks to the Library Director and staff for the cooperation shown to us over the years. The 20 year journey has been quite an adventure for the Board and all the volunteers who have worked along side us.

As noted above to mark the BIG DAY we are holding Open House Saturday, April 10th, 10:00 A.M. - 1:00 PM in the lower level of the Library. Come, bring the family, inspect the displays, meet Indians, interact in the demonstrations, and oh, yes, the coffeepot will be on!

CRYSTAL CREEK UPDATE – BIDS OPENED!

The Village is very happy to report that bids for the next phase of the Crystal Creek project have been opened. On March 5th the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) opened bids, two of which appear to be within the IDNR budget for this project. This means that, unless a problem arises with the potential contractor, a contract should be awarded by IDNR around the beginning of April. We would expect actual construction to begin as early as this June.

The Village intends to hold an informational meeting for residents who live along the Creek once a contractor is chosen. We expect this to occur sometime in April. Residents who are invited to this meeting will be notified directly.

VEHICLE STICKER PROGRAM UPDATE

The Village Board recently authorized the purchase of new software that will streamline and enhance customer service for the Village's Vehicle Sticker program. The new software will make processing the sticker purchases more efficient, improve the accuracy of the record keeping, and most importantly give residents the option to purchase their sticker online at no additional cost. These changes will be implemented as part of the new vehicle sticker year starting May 1st.

This upgrade is the latest effort by the Village to upgrade its technology capabilities and enhance customer service. Some of the other recent projects that were part of this effort were the new Village website, the new water billing and reading system, and the option for direct debit of your water bills. The new software package combined with the 24 hours a day online payment option will allow residents to renew their vehicle sticker(s) when they want to without leaving their house or writing a check. The Village is also planning to implement online payment of other Village services such as water bills and parking tickets later this year.

In a related note at the Board Meeting on March 9th the Village Board voted to increase Village vehicle sticker fees for the first time in six (6) years from \$15.00 to \$20.00, effective with the upcoming vehicle sticker year starting May 1st. The sticker fees for other types of vehicles were also increased at a similar rate. Senior Citizens will continue to receive the same discount as before – one \$20.00 sticker per individual.

This increase is primarily due to the fact that like virtually all communities across Illinois and for that matter the entire country, Schiller Park is feeling the effect of the current economic downturn. Because the Village has carefully watched our expenditures over the years we remain fiscally strong. During these tough times the Village does, however, have to look at all potential options for saving money or raising revenue in order to maintain quality services and keep the Village fiscally sound. Despite the increase Schiller Park stickers remain less than most other communities in the Chicago area.

Lastly, as a reminder, the new stickers go on sale May 1st and to avoid a penalty you need to purchase yours by June 30th.

ILLICIT DISCHARGE REPORTING

It is illegal to release anything other than storm-water which is free of pollutants to the maximum extent practicable to a storm-water conveyance system! Storm-water conveyance systems include streets, curbs and gutter, storm drains, and ditches.

You may call the local jurisdiction at 847-671-8554 to report an illicit discharge or a potential illicit discharge. Please provide a detailed account of the incident (i.e. date, time, location, responsible party, nature of the incident) when you call to report an illicit discharge.

When asked about the donation, Firefighter Association President Blaine Schneider said "The main driving force of our association is community. FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

FIRE INFORMATION REACHES EVERYONE (F.I.R.E.)

A program that was pioneered and developed here in Schiller Park was presented at the Illinois Fire Inspectors annual Public Education Conference in Galena.

The program that pairs firefighters with classes in the 4th Grade has been very successful and the model will now be used throughout Illinois and Iowa. The conference brings together fire department public education officers and members of the Illinois State Fire Marshals office to help promote fire safety.

Currently, six members of our department participate in the program. The firefighters act as mentors and big brothers and also provide monthly educational opportunities. The goal of our public education program is Saving Lives Through Education.

FIRE DEPARTMENT HIRES NEW MEMBERS

The Schiller Park Fire Department recently swore in several new personnel including FF/PM Timothy Bubis, FF/PM Nicholas Santiago, FF/PM Michael Miletta and FF/PM Jason Werner. Each of the new members attended the fire academy and was then assigned to a shift. The fire department currently has one unfilled opening. The Fire and Police Commission is currently establishing a new eligibility list to fill this position.

FROM THE BUILDING OFFICIAL

CONSTRUCTION SEASON APPROACHING

Spring and summer are just around the corner and with the improved weather comes the construction season and lots of home improvement projects. Most projects from sidewalks, fence replacements, and siding and window replacement will require a building permit. Check with the Building Dept. at (847) 671-8555 to see if your project requires a permit. Someone will be available to assist you from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM Monday-Friday.

In other news a State mandated law that will go into effect on April 22nd, 2010 pertains to lead abatement. This is mandated by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA). It is called the RRP Rule which stands for renovation, repair, and painting. It states contractors performing renovation, repair, and painting projects that disturb lead-based paint in homes, child care facilities, and schools built before 1978 must be certified by the USEPA and must follow specific work practices to prevent lead contamination. As a homeowner hiring a contractor, be sure that they are RRP Certified and registered with the Village.

BEWARE CONSTRUCTION SCAMS!

Spring unfortunately brings out less-than-scrupulous characters pretending to be contractors offering terrific deals on work around the house. The most common are driveway sealing, roof work, gutters, and sidewalks. Here are some tips to avoid trouble:

- If someone says they have some "left over materials" from a job nearby and they can give you a great deal on the work – be suspicious.
- Reputable contractors advertise right on their truck or van. If their vehicle has no markings – be suspicious.
- If it sounds too good to be true – it probably is.
- If you ask about getting a permit from the Village and they object, they may not be on the up-and-up.
- If they are in a hurry to get a deposit and start the work immediately – it's trouble.
- Don't let them rush you into a decision.
- Most work needs a permit, but even if it doesn't – call the Village to ask.

Every contractor doing work in the Village of Schiller Park must have a Village contractor's license. This license means that the Village knows who they are and we have all their information including their insurance. One simple call to (847) 671-8555 and we can tell you if they are licensed.

Best advice: if you are uncomfortable, tell them you have to think about it and you will call them back. A reputable contractor will hold a price for you for at least a couple days. If you have any concerns call the Village's Community Development Department at (847) 671-8555.

STORM-WATER AWARENESS

WHAT IS STORM-WATER RUN-OFF?

Storm-water runoff occurs when precipitation from rain or snowmelt flows over the ground. Impervious surfaces like driveways, sidewalks, and streets prevent storm-water runoff from naturally soaking into the ground.

WHY IS STORM-WATER RUNOFF A PROBLEM?

Storm-water can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river, wetland, or coastal water. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the bodies of water we use for swimming, fishing and that provide drinking water.

WHAT ARE THE EFFECTS OF POLLUTION?

Polluted storm-water runoff can have many adverse effects on plants, fish, animals and people.

Sediment can cloud the water and make it difficult or impossible for aquatic plants to grow. Sediment also can destroy aquatic habitats.

Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms. When algae die, they sink to the bottom and decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic organisms can't exist in water with low dissolved oxygen levels.

Bacteria and other pathogens can wash into swimming areas and create health hazards, often making beach closures necessary.

Debris - plastic bags, six-pack rings, bottles, and cigarette butts - washed into waterbodies can choke, suffocate, or disable aquatic life like ducks, fish, turtles, and birds.

Household hazardous wastes like insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil, and other auto fluids can poison aquatic life. Land animals and people can become sick from eating diseased fish and shellfish or ingesting polluted water.

Polluted storm-water often affects drinking water sources. This, in turn, can affect human health and increase drinking water treatment costs.

WHAT ARE STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO HELP MITIGATE THE PROBLEM?

- Recycle or properly dispose of household products that contain chemicals, such as insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, and used motor oil and other auto fluids. Don't pour them onto the ground or into storm drains.
- Don't over-water your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler.
- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or streams.
- Cover piles of dirt or mulch being used in landscaping projects.

YARD WASTE & BRANCH COLLECTION PROCEDURES

If you're planning on doing some yard work this spring and summer you might want to brush up on the Village's processes for yard waste and branch collection. Since there are different rules and pickup days for yard waste and branches it is important to know and understand the specific rules for each program.

YARD WASTE

This includes items like grass clippings, twigs, shrubbery, and dead plants or flowers. Collection is made by GROOT (our normal garbage hauler) on the normal pickup day of Friday (starts April 2nd). You have two options for curbside disposal of yard waste - (1) Utilize a 30 gallon or smaller generic, biodegradable, paper bag, or (2) Use a 35 gallon or less sized garbage can for landscape waste only (this must be marked with Village supplied stickers stating "landscape waste"). These stickers can be obtained at Village Hall and are free. This service is provided until November 24th.

BRANCH PICKUP

This service is provided directly by the Village's Department of Public Works and is done on Monday (starts March 29th) throughout the spring and summer. Please ensure your branches are out at the curb prior to 7:00 AM on Monday morning. The Public Works crew will come by and "chip" the branches into woodchips. The chips are then used by Public Works in various projects in the Village. If you have questions about the branch pickup program or you are interested in getting some woodchips from the Village's stockpile please contact Joseph Meyers, Director of Public Works at (847) 671-8554.

PREVENTING POLLUTION IN OUR WATERWAYS

Water covers over 70% of the Earth's surface and is a very important resource for people and the environment. Water pollution affects drinking water, rivers, lakes and oceans all over the world. This consequently harms human health and the natural environment.

Water pollution can come from a number of different sources. If the pollution comes from a single source, such as an oil spill, it is called point-source pollution. If the pollution comes from many sources, it is called non point-source pollution.

If you want to help keep our waters clean, there are many things you can do to help. You can prevent water pollution of nearby rivers and lakes as well as groundwater and drinking water by following some simple guidelines in your everyday life.

Conserve water by turning off the tap when running water is not necessary. This helps prevent water shortages and reduces the amount of contaminated water that needs treatment.

- Be careful about what you throw down your sink or toilet. Don't throw paints, oils or other forms of litter down the drain.
- Use environmentally-friendly household products, such as washing powder, household cleaning agents and toiletries.
- Take great care not to overuse pesticides and fertilizers. This will prevent runoffs of the material into nearby water sources.
- Don't throw litter into rivers, lakes or oceans. Help clean up any litter you see on beaches or in rivers and lakes, make sure it is safe to collect the litter and put it in a nearby trash can.
