MAYOR'S UPDATE

CRYSTAL CREEK PROJECT MOVES FORWARD

As many of you are aware the Village has been working diligently with the State of Illinois on a major project to improve storm drainage along Crystal Creek that will benefit

the entire Village. I reported to you in April that the Village finally obtained all the necessary easements for the project and has been moving forward since that time with preparations for the project itself.

As I previously indicated the Village needs to relocate our existing water service pipes that are in the way of the projected creek construction. I am happy to report that this phase of the project has moved forward well and is scheduled to begin this summer and be completed this year. Other utilities such as Nicor and ComEd still have to do their relocating work before construction can begin but the progress made so far this year is encouraging.

In addition the Village recently received an update from the State of Illinois on their planning for the construction phase of the project. Due to these recent positive developments it is looking increasingly likely that the Village's previous estimate of construction beginning in 2009 will be correct. I want to thank all of the residents

whose cooperation with the Village on this process has made this progress possible. It seems that all of the hard work and effort put into this project over the years is paying off, and the construction of this major flood control improvement is in sight.

On another note I am very excited that the new Water Park will be opening for its second season on Monday June 9, 2008. Based on comments from patrons last year we have decided to add a couple of additional spray-play toys to the tot area for this season which should further improve this already amazing facility. For all of you that enjoyed the new facility last summer I'm sure you are just as excited as I am. For those of you who did not make it to the Water Park during last year's construction shortened season I hope you will have the chance to visit this summer and enjoy this wonderful new community amenity.

HAVE ANY SENSITIVE PERSONAL DOCUMENTS YOU WANT SHREDDED?

The Village may have an opportunity that would interest you. The Mayor and the Village Board want to announce a Village sponsored shredding event for residents! On Thursday June 26th from 1:00 PM – 3:00 PM at the Village Hall (9526 W. Irving Park Road) the Village will have a shredding truck available to shred your sensitive personal documents. As an environmental plus the resulting debris will then be recycled. Village residents (no businesses please) will be permitted to bring up to two (2) boxes each for shredding (these should be no larger than “bankers sized” or approximately 4’ by 2’ by 2’).

Additionally the Village has an option for those residents who have documents they want shredded but who cannot make the scheduled afternoon event. These residents will be able to drop-off their material at the Village Hall starting at 7:00 AM that morning and then have the documents shredded later that day. The Village will provide a secure drop-off point for residents who choose this option.

Residents coming to the event will be asked to enter the Village Hall parking lot from Irving Park Road and then drive their vehicle to the rear of the Village Hall complex to have their documents shredded. They will then be directed to exit the complex via the rear alley on Grace Street. Village staff will be on hand to direct traffic and help residents with their boxes. In addition the Police Department will have officers at the event to answer resident questions about identity theft and related crimes. 50/50 TREE PROGRAM AVAILABLE

The Village wants to notify all residents and businesses that the Village’s 50/50 Tree Program is available for signup this year. The program offers residents and businesses the opportunity to have a new tree(s) planted in the parkway in front of their home for only 50% of the total cost, with the Village picking up the other 50%. There are a variety of different types of trees available. The planting of certain species of trees will take place this fall, other species will be planted in the spring of 2009. RIVER ROAD RESURFACING MAY TAKE PLACE IN 2008!

As you may recall the Village informed residents in the April Communicator Newsletter that the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) had Des Plaines River Road within Schiller Park listed on their preliminary list of resurfacing projects to be done in 2009. The Village is happy to report that it now appears possible that this work will be done in 2008 rather than 2009!

The Village has been pushing IDOT for some time to repair all of the State highways in the Village. These highways are Mannheim Road, Lawrence Avenue, Des Plaines River Road, and Irving Park Road. IDOT did resurfacing work on Mannheim Road and a portion of Lawrence Avenue last year and is resurfacing Irving Park Road this summer. That left River Road as the only State highway in the Village that had not had any recent work done and IDOT has informed the Village that this may be addressed in the fall of 2008.

This schedule is subject to change and is not official yet but we are happy to see IDOT considering the possibility, particularly since the condition of River Road has deteriorated a great deal in recent years – particularly during this past winter.

AT&T “LIGHTSPEED” PROJECT MOVES FORWARD

AT&T has begun, or soon will, the installation of new white control boxes in a handful of spots around the Village. These control boxes are a part of AT&T’s “Lightspeed” project that will allow them to offer a new television programming option into most Village homes. It is the obligation of every property owner in the Village to maintain their property. The requirement that homeowners maintain their property is part of the Village Code and is enforced by the Community Development Department. This is important because properly maintained homes help the appearance of the neighborhood and keep property values strong.

Proper maintenance includes the building(s) and any yard that may be attached to it. Properly maintaining the yard requires, at a minimum, cutting the grass throughout the growing season. The Village would appreciate your help to ensure that the grass is cut regularly at all properties within the Village, so please let us know if you notice a property where the grass is not being cut. The Village tries to identify all the properties where the grass is not being cut but sometimes one may escape our notice so it helps to have observant residents help us keep our list complete.

Please contact the Community Development Department at (847) 671-8555 if you see a house where the grass has been neglected for an extended time. Thank you helping keeping the Village a beautiful community.

WEST GATEWAY DEVELOPMENT

The Northwest Mack building just west of the tollway has been demolished. This will make way for a number of airport-related businesses in the West Gateway redevelopment area.

PROGRAMS OFFERED FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES

The Village of Schiller Park is a member of Northeast DuPage Special Recreation Association (NEDSRA), which provides recreational opportunities to both children and adults with disabilities. NEDSRA is a cooperative of eight park districts and three village recreation departments in northeast DuPage and west Cook Counties, formed in 1976 to combine resources and avoid duplication in providing recreation programs and services for people with disabilities. Our mission is to serve as an integral partner with our member park districts and villages to positively impact people with disabilities through diverse recreation opportunities and community services. NEDSRA's primary purpose is to improve the quality of life for individuals with disabilities in our member communities by providing recreation services comparable to those available to people without disabilities, thereby helping each individual reach their highest level of independence.

NEDSRA has grown from serving a few hundred individuals in 1977 to serving more than 4,500 separate individuals during 2004-2005.

SAFE DRINKING WATER ESSENTIALS

BACKFLOW PREVENTION DEVICES

When we turn on a faucet we assume the water is safe to drink or "potable". To ensure the continued protection of our water supply, the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act and our plumbing code require "backflow prevention devices".

When supply water pressure drops (due to water main breaks, fire fighting, line flushing, etc.) the water lines in your house or business might have greater pressure than the main. This reverses the "flow" of the water from your property back into the water main. This can contaminate the water supply, rendering it unsafe to drink. This is the usual cause of "boil orders". Given this risk, federal, state and local laws require the use of backflow prevention devices. A "backflow protector device" is a valve that every Illinois licensed plumber installs and can answer questions about.

BUSINESSES

All commercial facilities require backflow protection. The appropriate device[s] must be attached and tested annually. The Village will provide you with further information to annually verify testing.

RESIDENTS

You will need a backflow prevention device IF you have one of the following:

- 1) In-ground lawn sprinkler system.
- 2) Swimming pools and hot tubs require a backflow prevention device on water supply lines.
- 3) Solar heating systems.
- 4) Boilers require a backflow prevention device on water supply lines.
- 5) Any other "auxiliary" water supply.

RESIDENTS

Even if your house does not require a device, you can help protect our drinking water with:

- 1) Outside hose faucets – Buy/Install only those with a vacuum breaker.
- 2) Buy/Install only faucets with an 'air gap' – the spout should be higher than the top of the sink. This prevents siphoning.
- 3) Ball cocks (water intakes) in toilets require anti-reverse parts. These features are standard in all code approved toilets.

To assist the Village with maintaining a database of backflow prevention devices please arrange to fill out a form with information about your backflow prevention device(s). These forms can be obtained at the Village Hall or the Community Development Department. If you have questions you want answered about backflow prevention devices or if you have a concern about safe drinking water, please call the Village Plumbing Inspector Ron Crement at (847) 671-8561.

COMMUNITY POLICING CORNER

HOME SCAMS

With warm weather approaching, scams aimed at the Elderly will be increasing. Senior citizens need to be reminded that they should not open the doors to any visitors they are not expecting. Over the past several summers, residents of Schiller Park and other local communities have been victims of various ruse scams. Ruse scams are incidents that normally occur in daylight hours, in which the suspect will, literally, walk right into someone's home for the purpose of stealing jewelry or money. Very often, the homeowner is either in or near the home. If these individuals are caught, they give some kind of excuse as to why they are in the home or on the property.

- Suspect(s) will pretend to be legitimate worker(s) and approach senior citizen home owners at their residences with a seemingly legitimate ruse. Their real purpose is to divert the homeowner while their accomplices search for currency and jewelry.
- Some of the more frequently used ploys by the suspects are: indicating they are from the local gas/electric company; posing as a water department employee

to inspect the water pipes and/or to replace the water meter; a request to use the bathroom; a cable TV company employee; roofing/gutter repair and paving company contractor; city inspector(s), surveyor(s), and tree trimmer(s); or government personnel from a social service agency.

- Many of the impostor burglars now have bogus photo identification cards, legitimate looking work uniforms, and vehicles made to look like government or company vehicles. They may also communicate with hand-held radios or cell phones. If you have any doubt, tell them you are going to call their company or the Village to verify their identity. You may also call the Police.
- Women and children may also accompany male suspects and participate in the diversion of the homeowner

TELEMARKETING SCAMS

According to the FTC, nearly 25 million Americans are victims of consumer fraud each year. Senior citizens continue to be a rapidly increasing segment of the population, and that makes them a prime target for con artists and thieves. Americans who are 65 or older represent about 13 percent of our country's population, and their population will only continue to grow as the Baby Boomer generation begins to enter that age range. Studies have shown that senior citizens are more at risk to be targeted by telemarketing scams than other age groups, and fraudulent telemarketers direct anywhere from 56 to 80 percent of their calls at older Americans. These

con-artists believe that senior citizens are vulnerable and more susceptible to their tricks. The Schiller Park Police remind you of the following:

- Offers too good to be true usually are. Ask to receive the "unbelievable deal" or the "amazing prize offer" in writing so you can read it carefully before making a commitment.
- Never give out your personal information over the phone or Internet unless you have initiated the contact. Legitimate business callers will never ask you for this information over the phone.
- If a caller asks you to pay for an offer in advance or asks for your credit card number or Social Security number, tell the person you don't give out personal information over the telephone.
- Remember that legitimate telemarketers won't be turned off if you use these techniques. They will appreciate dealing with an educated consumer. It's not rude – it's shrewd!

The best way to keep these individuals from victimizing you is to simply keep your home locked, even when you are working in the yard. Remember, anytime you are outside your home, you cannot possibly see every door on your home that a would-be thief would use. FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

ELECTRICITY AND FIRE

Electrical fires are different from other fires. Throwing water on an electrical fire can cause the fire to get larger or result in electrocution.

- NEVER use water on an electrical fire.
- Call 9-1-1 and tell them there is a fire
- Use a proper fire extinguisher if you are going to attempt to fight the fire

- Let everyone know that there is a fire, sound the alarm
- Leave the house or building immediately and take everyone with you

EMERGENCY PLAN

In the event of an emergency, STAY CALM and remember to:

1. Follow your fire escape plan. Make sure everyone gets out quickly and have an

accountability plan for everyone.

2. If possible shut the door to the fire area.
3. If you do not know how to properly use a fire extinguisher, leave the premises.
4. Meet at a safe place and make sure that everyone is accounted for.
5. Call fire department at 9-1-1.
6. NEVER go back inside the burning building for ANY reason.

BABYSITTING

If you are babysitting, you are responsible for your own safety and the safety of others.

Here are a few tips:

- Know the family's name
- Know the address of the home
- Know how to contact the parents

- Have emergency numbers available.
- Know how to use the family's cordless phone.

a smoke alarm. It is very important to clean a smoke alarm regularly! You never want to place a smoke alarm near any heating vent. Smoke alarms should have a recognized testing label on them. Early warning of a fire can save lives. Remember that the smell of smoke does not always wake you up if you are sleeping. The air closest to the floor is the safest to breath during a fire because smoke rises.

SMOKE ALARMS

A smoke alarm should be tested once a month. Smoke alarm batteries should be replaced twice a year. Every level of a house should have
