“911, What’s your Emergency?”

Our current reporting period covers the activities that Schiller Park responded to in the last month. The following incidents are the firefighters and paramedics more unique calls. As always Schiller Park members responded to any call for help.

This month we begin on March 13th when a resident locked himself out of his condo. Black shift informed him that there could be slight damage to the door and the resident decided that a locksmith was a better option.

The following Black shift March 16th, Engine 5 responded to wires down in the street. After cordoning off the area Com Ed was notified.

Red shift on March 17th, St. Patrick's Day, Lt. Budnik and his crew responded to wires down. On scene it was determined that the wires were cable television and were not down but hanging “low”. COMCAST was called to re-string the cable wire.

A residents call to the fire department later in the shift indicated that a detector was going off in their house. A Schiller Park fire response arrived and found that the detector was tripped by steam from the occupant cooking.

Gold shift responded to a motor vehicle accident on the 18th. As they were en-route to the scene they were informed that it was a multi-car accident with one in the creek. On scene B/C Hatcher and the crew found a SUV upside down in the creek. Members created a safe working area and removed the occupants who were then transported.

St. Joseph Day, March 19th, had Black shift take in an automatic fire alarm. When B/C Leiser and his shift arrived, they found the alarm silenced. The fire investigative team then located the cause as a Pull Station activated as a result of storage being placed too near it.

Red shift on the 20th had a gas leak in a house. Engine 5 responded and found low readings at the front door. As they continued to look into this, the members located the source of the leak in the black pipe. The gas was shut off and the owner stated he would make the repair and call NICOR to turn gas back on.

B/C Hatcher's shift on the 22nd was dispatched to a PACE bus fire. On scene they found the bus on the side of the road with smoke showing and the bus evacuated. Members accessed the battery disconnect and opened the engine compartment panels. Mechanically minded members determined that the turbo charger and oil dripping on the hot engine caused the smoke. Another bus was called for the passengers.

The next day Black shift took in a report of a chimney fire. Upon arrival light smoke was emulating from the chimney. Upon entering the residence and speaking with the owner, the owner indicated that he was burning cardboard in his fireplace and there was no chimney fire.

Lt. Leiser on the 23rd, responded to Stone Park as the on shift fire investigator. Stone Park requested a fire investigator Box Alarm at the scene of their structure fire. Lt. Leiser assisted with the origin and cause.

March 23rd had Black shift take in a fire alarm in an industrial building. When the units arrived they were told that while pressure washing a detector got wet and activated the alarm.

While a hotel kitchen was preparing meals for over a hundred guests on the 25th, the steam from cooking set off a detector in the vicinity. No other problem was found and the kitchen was able to continue cooking for the guests.

FF/PM Santiago working as an Acting Officer on the 26th, took in a call with his engine for an odor investigation. They found a light haze coming from the laundry room and traced it to the clothes drier. Taking it a part, they

found previous burn marks inside the drum and members were told that something similar occurred about a month ago. The dryer was de-energized and the gas shut off until it could be repaired or replaced. Community Development was also notified.

The next call for the shift was for an automatic fire alarm in a 40 unit apartment building. The fire investigation team located one apartment on the second floor where burnt food set off the alarm.

In a commercial building that is being vacated, Black shift March 29th found that workers had clipped a sprinkler head causing a water flow alarm. The system was shut down so that repairs could be made before placing back in service.

There was no April Fooling on the 1st when Red shift took in a fire alarm. In this vacant building a worker was doing electrical work and accidentally set off the alarm.

April 3rd and a structure fire in Elmwood Park had them call for an Investigators Box Alarm. Lt. Leiser was again the on-duty investigator who responded to their request for help in determining the origin and cause.

Red shift on the 4th took in a car fire in the middle of the intersection. A line was dropped and 250 gallons of water were used to put out the fire under the hood. The driver said that she was driving when she saw smoke from under the hood and stopped. She then saw flames and called 9-1-1

Lt. Budnik in charge of Red shift on the 10th was requested to the toll way for a Pin In. Getting to the scene a SUV was found pinned along the Jersey concrete barrier. Two additional ambulances were requested to the scene as six patients were encountered. Rosemont and Franklin Park both responded and transported along with Schiller Park.

Prior to shift change on the 11th, Red shift took in another fire alarm. They found a pull station activated for no

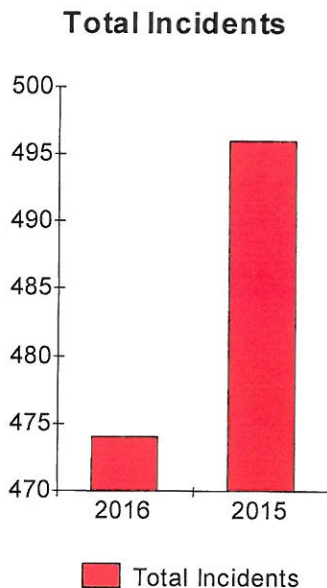
cause. A walk through of the building also found no reason and the system was restored.

Engine Company Officer Lt. Swiontek and his crew were dispatched to an odor investigation on the 12th. In the hallway the crew was met by residents who state they smell something burning in the hallway. The light in the hallway seemed to be the cause and the cover was removed revealing charred wires. Power was disconnected to the fixture and building maintenance was to be notified.

Gold shift had a call for wires down on the 14th with Lt. Leiser and the engine taking in the call. Arriving they found the service drop detached and hanging. Bystanders indicated that it was arching and it was now creating a brush fire. Inside a machine was overheating and malfunctioning. The machine was shut down and maintenance was taking over.

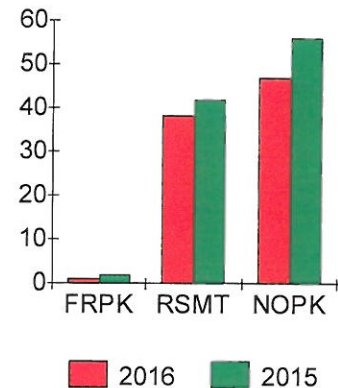
The last call of the reporting period occurred on April 14th where a motor vehicle accident also involved a bike. Gold shift assessed and treated the bicyclist and the driver.

The following is the total run count compared with the same reporting period from 2015:



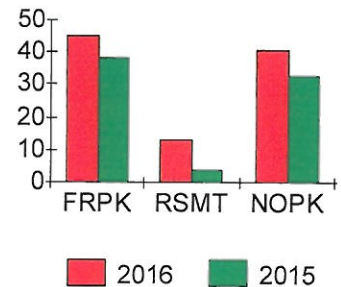
The run summary for Automatic Aid as of March 31st "To" the following communities:

We Stagnate When Caution Prevails

Our condolences to the family of Jim Zegar (ret. Public Works) who passed away this past month. Members of the fire department were present at both his wake and funeral services with a walk through and a salute.

We were also saddened by the lost of our Fire and Police Secretary, Gail Botti's, father Anthony Fillicaro. May they rest in peace.

The final bell was answered by Chief Hjellum (ret.) Elmwood Park this past month. He was retired and living in the southwest where he passed away.

FF/PM LiRosi continues to be off work as a result of an on-duty injury.

Our congratulations to our Schiller Park Police Department on the promotion of several members. Tom Fragakis was promoted from Lieutenant to Police Chief and Sgt. Joe Desimone to Lieutenant. (see photos).

Congratulations to Chief Tracy Kenny (BRDV) who was appointed the full time position for Broadview.

Chief Chiodo was invited to the set of Chicago Fire this past month. He was able to visit fictional station 51 (a.k.a Engine 18) Chicago Firehouse. The actual firehouse is used primarily for exterior and apparatus floor shots. All other parts of the show are filmed, shot, at a Westside studio. (see photo).

Our congratulations to members of Gold shift who performed outstanding lifesaving efforts on March 18th. Members were able to successfully resuscitate a 69 year old man including defibrillation to a pulseless man in ventricular fibrillation. He was

able to have a return to spontaneous circulation. Bystanders also assisted prior to the fire department arrival with CPR.

With the arrival of the new lockers we are requesting that no items be placed on top of the lockers nor on the exterior.

The Illinois Toll Way has given us authorization to use several STARCOMM frequencies when responding to the toll way. This will be part of the inter-operability to communicate with the toll way workers and Illinois State Police. Hopefully this will work better than the previous attempt with IREACH.

A copy of the 2016 general Orders have been added to the target Solutions web page for your reference.

The Village is working with GINKGO Planning on a new Village-wide comprehensive plan. Preliminary meetings have been held with the different departments. The fire department was represented by the Staff/Line Officers. The consultants plan on meeting weekly to determine needs as they develop the plan. A final version will take approximately one year.

The Village has allowed us to sell surplus equipment on Ebay. We are looking into this as a way of disposing equipment that the taxpayers have purchased as opposed to donating it.

We are looking at getting voluntary compliance with numbering or lettering the stairways in our multi-story buildings. This would aid residents and firefighters in identifying the fire attack and evacuation stairways.

Another project is to identify which elevators our stretchers can be fit in by placing a Star of Life on the

elevator(s) that we can get our stretcher into. A blue bar under the Star of Life will indicate that the stretcher can be fully vertical in the elevator. |

Tools / Equipment and Other FYI's

A number of items have been worked on this past month.

Items worked on and happenings around the firehouse this month include:

Squad 5 (453) had a problem with the turbo-charger this past month. Tony was able to change out the turbo. After returning to service an electronic problem occurred requiring it to be sent to Global for repair and diagnostics.

Tower ladder 5 (454) also is still at Global for its yearly preventive maintenance. It should return shortly.

Engine 5 (455) had a low voltage warning that Tony was able to repair after consulting Global.

Tony also repaired and replaced warning lights on battalion 5 (451) this past month.

Other items in the firehouse:

Members cleaned out the floor drains on the apparatus floor that were clogged. Members also worked with the public works members to clean out the overhead sewer line from the 2nd floor kitchen. (see pictures).

The East overhead door failed this past month needing attention and a repair.

FF/PM Bertoncini was able to repair one of our self contained breathing apparatus this past month. Lou is one of our certified technicians.

Lt. Budnik has installed a green works cleaning system. This will proportion all of our cleaning products to reduce waste and expense.

The new windows for the firehouse

have also been delivered. We will store them at 4499 25th until the weather gets consistently warm as we remove the old ones and install with firefighter labor, the new ones.

We are also working on the new logos which will be applied to the vehicles and eventually our new scrambled SPFD. (see photo) Lt. Leiser is also working on new logo for our duty class C shirts.

EMS Briefs

Just an update on activities within the bureau...

Continuing Education for March was Respiratory Distress.

The next prescription pill take back day is scheduled for April 30th on the rear apparatus floor from 10:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M. NO SHARPS!!

All fire and police personnel completed annual blood borne pathogen training.

FF/Pm Bubis did one car seat inspection. We are looking for additional members interested in becoming car seat specialists. Please see Tim for more info.

We have also had the first zika reported case in Illinois. This is mosquito born and normally repellent should protect you. As information is made available we will pass it on.

Both Ambulance 5 and 6 had new pediatric and Adult Blood Pressure cuffs placed on the rigs.

Tony worked on the preventive maintenance for ambulance 6. This included repairing the air leak.

We have removed the electric shavers from the ambulances and replaced them with disposable razors.

Lt. Swiontek has passed out to all members Health History forms. We ask that you fill them out and turn them back in at the EMS office and sign off that you placed them in the locked box. If you choose to decline,

fill out the last page and return it.

Please make sure that all signatures on EMS forms are legible including your own. It is important for billing and identifying persons on the call, patient and other identifying information (see photo).

There were 7 CPR classes that members taught this past month with a total of 19 students.

FF/PM Bubis will work with B/C Cesaretti to schedule the CPR training and re-certification for all members.

FF/PM Bubis is also working on a new program for residents for family hands on only CPR. We will have more info in the near future.

Whenever you transport to any hospital as a matter of habit please check to see if we have any backboards that were left there from patient transports. This will help retrieve them and cut down on the time they are out of service and unavailable.

On the horizon is the new Mobile Integrated Health Care System/Plan. If you are not familiar with it begin to explore its impact on the fire/EMS services and the expectations. This is popping up more frequently in the literature and will affect our department. We will soon have Connie Mattera from NWCH come in and explain their model. If you want more information see Lt. Swiontek.

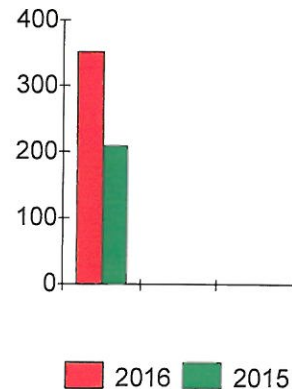
We would like to remind all personnel that when they are exchanging or retrieving drugs from the hospitals, that you check and verify the dosages. With different manufactures and packaging we must make sure that the correct dosages are picked up.

The Northwest Community Hospital website for Continuing Education has a ton of information that can assist paramedics with continuing education and also provide assistance on the monthly training. If you have not had an opportunity to check the website it would be advisable.

During the past month personnel responded to 129 emergency calls. A total of 117 patients were encountered. 86 patients were transported to area hospitals.

Office of the State Fire Marshal and Training

Failure to Train is Training to Fail

The training division has been active in defining and charting a course for our department.

Chief Chiodo and B/C Cesaretti attended the Division 20 Training Officers meeting.

Chief Chiodo attended the Division 20 Chiefs monthly meeting. He also continued his Pension training as part of the new Trustee program.

FF/PM Santiago attended technical rescue training in Northlake.

FF/PM Jackson participated in training with the Honor Guard and a detail this past month.

FF/Pm Zydlo completed CPR instructor course.

B/C Cesaretti has purchased for the department Target Solutions a training program for tracking and assigning training. This is an internet based program that all the shifts have been trained on. It seems to be working very well in tracking our training in all areas.

The State Fire Marshal is transitioning to a new Fire Officer program. Continuing Education will be a requirement for this certification. Their goal is to have all certifications have continuing education.

We will try to bring some of the Cornerstone programs to Schiller Park. These classes are provided free through the Illinois Fire Service Institute.

B/C Cesaretti has purchased the

complete set of Jones and Bartlett fire books. These are the books that the academies are using for training as well as the Fire Officer classes. We will be phasing out the old IFSTA manuals.

The promotional exam for lieutenant is NOT based on Jones and Bartlett manuals. They currently do not have a promotional exams based on their texts. The Commission will continue to use IFSTA.

The Training Committee is exploring ways of creating a Training Center at Station 6 with props.

B/C Cesaretti has received a DVD training simulator where we can use pictures of buildings in town and I will be able to set up different scenarios.

I have signed up several members for OSFM classes as part of their job requirements. If you know that you need a class please let me know, I will try to find one, however if you find one on your own please submit the paperwork and maintain a copy for yourself.

Members completed 373 hours of training for the month with 31 training drills. This includes outside classes.

The second Thursday of each month the State Fire Marshal has a testing site at Triton College. They have also instituted a new policy of a government issued picture ID at the test site. If you cannot produce one you will not be allowed in. Likewise they are requesting that all phones be left in the test takers car to help with the integrity of the test (too many camera phones).If you would like to sign up see B/C. Cesaretti.

State Exams are a duty assignment and failure to show up will result in disciplinary action. We will try to sign up for exams at Triton on shift days. If you attend a class it is our expectation that you take and PASS the State exam. If you do not pass, you will not be able to take further classes.

Please fill an Outside Training Form whenever you attend a class, seminar or training session outside of Schiller

Park. This allows for accurate record keeping in those areas and credit for the hours you put into training.

Signing up for tests is considered a Duty Assignment. If you can't attend see me in advance and provide a written response for the absence.

Special Operations

- Fire Investigations

On Duty fire investigators responded to one Box alarm within the Division for Fire Investigators. Lt. Leiser responding to Stone Park for the origin and cause.

Members trained with Division investigators with the topic presented by electrical engineer on electrical fires.

Fire Investigators can log into Target Solutions to track and keep a running total of their hours for re-certification.

The Schiller Park Fire Department has 3 active fire investigators and our Police department has two active Arson Investigators.

Hazardous Materials

No hazardous materials incidents occurred in Schiller Park and our technicians-advisors did not respond within the division. Members did monthly training with the Haz Mat Team with training on decontamination and bomb disposal.

- Technical Rescue

No technical rescue incidents occurred in Schiller Park and our members did not respond within the division to other incidents. Members participated in monthly training consisting of familiarization of the new rescue truck. Schiller Park has two active team members.

Employee of the Month

This month we acknowledge several members as our employees of the month. FF/PM Niemand, FF/PM Loch, and FF/PM Bertoncini and FF/PM Bubis of Gold shift.

FF/PM Niemand has worked diligently with the Village website committee and in particular on the Fire Department web page. A BETA version is available as it is tweaked. We hope to have a full roll out by Summer.

FF/PM :Loch took it upon himself to inventory our kitchen and supplies. He found that several of our cooking pots, pans and utensils were in very poor condition. After looking into our needs and consulting all three shifts, he went out and purchased new items. The usable old equipment will be donated to Fishes and Loaves.

Members of Gold shift along with Public Works also cleaned out the overhead drains. The stench was unbelievable and what came out was disgusting at best. Thanks for rodding out the sewer and drain. (see photo).

Fire Prevention

An Ounce of Prevention is Worth a Pound of Cure

Fire Prevention is trying to work with Community Development on all the new projects and developments that are in the planning or building stages

in Schiller Park.

The Bureau has been working on deficiencies that were brought to the attention of the Coordinator that needed B/C Hatchers direct involvement.

If any residential Knox Boxes are installed, please make sure that a copy of the paper work is scanned and entered into the shared Community Development files.

There are also several new commercial knox boxes for electrical shut offs that have come into town. (see photos).

Shifts are working on their 2016 inspections. Each shift received 1/3 of the inspections or about 135 per shift. The inspections are rotated so that over a three year period each shift should have the opportunity to enter all the businesses.

FF/PM Adam Niemand and B/C Hatcher continue to move the Bureau into the electronic age. The digital IPADS are working out great with both the inspectors and businesses accepting with open arms. Adam who is working on the new Village website also plans on having fire prevention forms available on the website to help expedite the process by businesses having these in advance or making another copy if necessary to update their file.

The State Fire Marshal is looking into having all inspectors do continuing education to remain certified. We are monitoring this and what constitutes training hours. One way it seems is to attend seminars and monthly training sessions.

B/C Hatcher continues to do plan review for businesses. These include their fire alarm systems, sprinkler systems and building alterations.

The Fire Prevention Office now has a dedicated Fax Line for paperwork. (847) 671-8547. Please check the bin for faxes that may pertain to your inspections.

As a reminder when we go on trouble

alarms we need to contact the owner to report that the alarm went into trouble and document that on the incident report and in the trouble alarm binder. Midwest may also be doing this as a back up to our call.

If you are interested in any plan review in Fire Prevention, please see B/C Hatcher. He will review what is coming into town based on what plans Community Development sends over.

Any member wishing to attend the monthly meeting of the Illinois Fire Inspectors Association should contact B/C Hatcher.

We are also suggesting and strongly recommending that sprinkler and standpipe connections be converted to sturtz fittings.

The State Fire Marshal is instituting a new certification program Inspector I. B/C Cesaretti is looking into the program if this should replace the Fire Prevention Principles as required before third year of hire. B/C Cesaretti will advise those needing the class when it is available. I

Public Affairs

Saving Lives Through Education

We continue to provide fire extinguisher demonstrations and CPR classes for residents and businesses in town.

FF/PM Schneider and FF/PM Warden are setting up monthly meetings for all Public Relations/Affairs coordinators in the Division. A meeting was held in Broadview and FF/PM Schneider coordinated the meeting.

We will be holding our End of Year Ice Cream Social on May 20th. It will be held from 6:30 until 8:30. Please consider signing up to help the on duty shift.

May 21st will see the annual Wall of Honor celebration at Clock Tower

Park. Our military residents whose names will be added will be honored.

Also on the 21st St. Maria Goretti will hold its 5K run.

We will also be resurrecting the Adopt-A-Firefighter for first grade at Kennedy school. This all will be a part of the Fire Information Reaches Everyone (F.I.R.E.) program that we developed several years ago.

We transported the Easter Bunny on March 26th to the Egg Hunt at Kennedy Park. (see photo).

We are working with our Police Department and the Knights of Columbus from St. Beatrice on a BLUE MASS honoring 1st Responders. This will be held in September at St. Beatrice.

Both the Public Relations and Fire Prevention arms of the Fire Department are working with Grace Condos as they transition with FOBS to enter their building. We will be looking for a MASTER FOB to be placed in the Knox Box.

We are also coordinating with other a fire service organizations the implementation and publicizing the "ICE" program (In Case of Emergency) for people's cell phones. I

Emergency Management

B/C Leiser is working on updating all of our NIMS certification as well as the compliancy of all Village employees. He will pass out to all department heads what certifications each employee needs to have for their level of participation. This will include all Village elected officials and administrators.

We will be working with Homeland Security and other Federal Agencies along with Rosemont as a large scale drill will be planned for the Fall.

A class will be held shortly for all members in writing Incident Action

Plans. These are now being required in more and more events.

We are also reviewing and making changes to the Village Disaster Plan. We are discussing portions that affect the Red Cross and village Health Board. We are looking to have in the new budget a mobile trailer for our EOC (Emergency Operations Center) and supplies.

We have had Alternate Power do maintenance on the Generator at the Community Center. It has been experiencing several problems lately. Ben Delaney our liaison coordinated the repair efforts. Unfortunately it is cost prohibitive to dump any more money into it and it will be taken out of service for now.

We also are working on the next Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) through the federal government for \$180,000 for new SCBA for everyone. Please submit your ideas so we can pare them down and then submit. We did not get our last grant.

Our grant writer is looking into the possibility of grants for a fire extinguisher simulator and money for enhancing our Emergency Operation Center. We are also applying for a grant for Fire Prevention Bureau signage for Truss roofs, FACP rooms, sprinkler rooms etc.

B/C Leiser also is working with Comcast to see about the steps necessary to use cable television in the event of an emergency.

We are updating the mass notification communication system for all current employees.

We are also reviewing our dispatch procedures and our Emergency Operations Center (EOC) looking at improvements. In order to comply with the new State laws on dispatch and ETSB consolidation we are looking at several alternatives.
