

# Booster Line

## “911, What’s your Emergency?”

Our current reporting period covers the activities that Schiller Park responded to in the last month. The following incidents are the firefighters and paramedics more unique calls. As always Schiller Park members responded to any call for help.

This month we begin on April 9<sup>th</sup> when Lt. Cesaretti and the crew responded to a child locked in the minivan. Members responded and were able to gain access and reunite mom and sleeping baby.

April 11<sup>th</sup> saw Red shift and Lt. Hatcher take in a carbon monoxide alarm call. On scene the problem was traced to one of the units where the oven was creating high levels. The tenant was told not to use the oven until a qualified service technician was called and the oven was cleaned.

A fire alarm in the early morning of April 14<sup>th</sup> had Lt. Budnik and the crew respond. Our 9-1-1 dispatch center then notified Lt. Budnik that the call was false and due to someone pulling a fire alarm pull station. Members then reset the alarm and returned to quarters.

After shift change Lt. Hatcher took in a landscaping fire at a residence in town. Arriving they found in the rear of the building a compost heap smoldering. The owner was stretching his own garden hose to use on the container. He had placed ashes from the grill into the bin and it smoldered the mulch and waste.

The next call this day was for another fire alarm this time in a business that was for a pull station. At the commercial structure it was determined that the pull station was accidentally damaged causing it to be tripped.

With the weather getting warmer and residents getting out to enjoy the temperatures a young person riding their bicycle was struck by an

automobile on April 14<sup>th</sup>. Mom arrived on scene and accompanied the child to the hospital to be checked out.

A call on April 18<sup>th</sup> had FF/PM Swiontek and his engine take in a call for arcing wires. On scene it was found that the arcing hissing wires was due to an electrical insect repellent system also known as a Bug Zapper that was in use.

A call to the toll way on the 14<sup>th</sup> took our equipment to a pin in accident. As members got to the scene, Elmhurst was also arriving. Extrication was performed on the vehicles involved and two of the occupants were fatalities.

April 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> saw a torrential downpour of rain of 5.25 inches in our area that caused the Des Plaines River to overflow its banks and cause severe flooding for several days.

During the flood members responded throughout town assisting residents and businesses. Members took in dozens of flooded basements and shut power off and other utilities to houses to make homes and businesses safe.

During this same period members responded to smoke in the basement. On scene Cmdr. Leiser and the crew found burnt ceiling tiles as a result from a halogen light fixture.

April 20<sup>th</sup> then saw Schiller Park members stand by at the River Road bridge at Lawrence when we were requested by Rosemont to stand by. A water rescue in Rosemont wanted us on standby as the swift water rescue was in progress. A successful rescue was made by Rosemont in this incident.

A four car accident at Mannheim and Lawrence on April 24<sup>th</sup> had our personnel respond and were backed up by a Chicago engine and ambulance. Both ambulances did make transports to the hospital.

A working fire in Norwood Park on April 25<sup>th</sup> had our tower ladder and ambulance respond. The tower ladder was put to work as an engine company in advancing the second

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hose line through the back door and down into the basement. Our ambulance transported the home owner to the hospital.

Red shift took in a call on the 29<sup>th</sup> for a car versus a semi truck in an accident with injuries. The driver of the car was entrapped requiring members to get out the hydraulic rescue tools to force open the driver side door. A hose line was dropped as a pre-caution and Chicago firefighters showed up soon thereafter. The driver was transported to a level 2 trauma center.

May 2<sup>nd</sup> began for Red shift with persons stuck in the elevator. The elevator was stopped between the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floors. Members were able to make access using our elevator keys in conjunction with maintenance on scene.

Cmdr. Chiodo was called to the scene of a carbon monoxide incident on May 3<sup>rd</sup> by Lt. Budnik. When on scene Lt. Budnik and the crew had elevated levels based on our monitoring. Lt. Budnik wanted permission to enter apartments to locate the source of the dangerous gas in the building. As we were about to continue our investigation, a resident came out and stated that he had his BBQ in the rear of the building and that the smoke entered the rear stairwell causing the alarms to go off. He removed the BBQ to the interior of his apartment and now had high levels of Carbon monoxide in his unit. The entire area was vented to safe levels.

Just afternoon Gold shift was requested to Norwood Park for a three car accident. Our ambulance responded and transported a critically injured patient.

May 6<sup>th</sup> saw parents at one of our parks fighting over their children playing on the playground equipment. Cmdr. Maher had to request a second ambulance when additional parents wanted to be evaluated.

Before midnight a smoldering dumpster behind an apartment complex had Cmdr. Maher and his

engine respond. Approximately 100 gallons of water were used to put out the trash fire.

Another trash fire on May 8<sup>th</sup> had Cmdr. Leiser and his shift respond. They were able to put out the rubbish with less than 100 gallons of fire.

Black shifts next call this day found them respond to a fire alarm. Upon arrival they had light smoke emulating from a side door of the commercial structure. The fire investigative crew found that hot parts were sprayed with oil and filled the building with smoke. Franklin Park assisted us with setting up positive pressure fans to ventilate the smoke. The fire alarm was then attempted to be restored.

Black shifts next response was automatic aid to Norwood Park for a working fire. Reporting to Command, our units were advised to help Norwood Engine 101 with a hose line.

Smoke detectors going off on the 8<sup>th</sup> had a response of the Schiller Park Fire Department only to find that the hot coals from a BBQ were placed in the attached garage and thus setting off the smoke detector.

Red shift took over and quickly began their tour of duty with a Hazardous Materials incident in Bensenville. Cmdr. Maher the on duty Safety Officer responded and worked with the Incident Commander and Operations Division until the situation was under control.

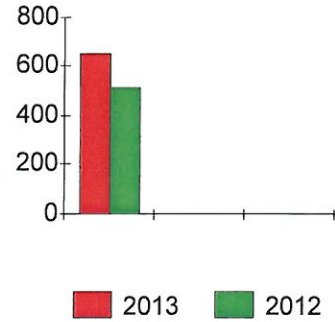
Several hours later Cmdr. Maher again returned to Bensenville as a Safety officer this time for a structure fire. Incident Command again worked with Cmdr. Maher for firefighter safety and accountability.

The last call for this period occurred on May 9<sup>th</sup> when an ambulance call had the tenant say they could not get up. When members attempted to do forcible entry, the tenant got much better and let the paramedics in.



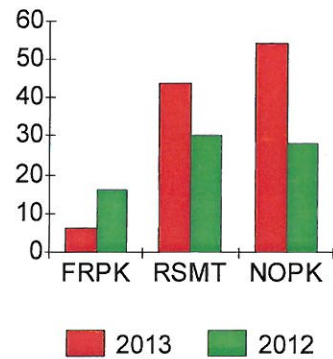
The following is the total run count compared with the same reporting period from 2012:

### Total Incidents



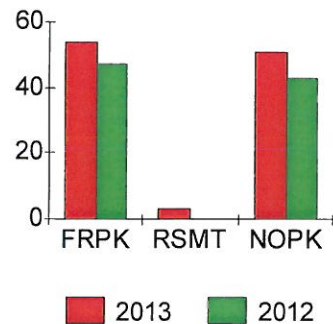
The run summary for Automatic Aid as of April 30<sup>th</sup> "To" the following communities:

## Commander's Cove

### *We Stagnate When Caution Prevails*

FF/PM Rupsis continues to be on extended medical leave. We anticipate his return by the middle of the month.

We would also like to wish Audrey Meyers and Joe Meyers well as they end their careers with the Village of Schiller Park. Audrey started off as an administrative assistant to the village Clerk until she became the administrative assistant to the Mayor. Joe started off with the Village as the sub foreman with the Public Works department before taking over as the Department head after Ron Sieracki's death.

As we approach Summer, Lt. Budnik has provided each shift with the 2013 list of hydrants to be flowed. We will only flush them this year and NOT test flow. Please make sure that all hydrants have a 2" wide blue reflective band on the barrel and a 1" band on the steamer port. This aids in locating them in the dark.

Division 20 held its Firefighters Ball for its Benevolent Fund for all members in the entire division. The fund raiser was held at the Beau Jolie on April 19<sup>th</sup> and was a formal event.

FF/PM Schneider represented our department at the event.

The U.S. Department of Transportation has given final approval for the Elgin-O'Hare western access project. Part of the project will also be the ring road by-pass for the toll way. The project and infra structure will start shortly.

The Village is also embarking on a water main replacement on Kolze from Marie to Seymour. The project will also include road re-surfacing.

The Historical Society here in Schiller Park will soon be sponsoring a trolley tour, an updated Eden Cemetery tour and a walk in Robinson Woods. This is open to all. If you are a member of the department and want to be acquainted with the history of the community where we work these are excellent opportunities. Contact June Ouland at the Historical Society for further information.

The NFPA is having its national conferences here in Chicago along with Fire Rescue International. Several of our staff members will be attending these prestigious seminars and conferences.

With the Village of Schiller Park entering its' Centennial year, the fire department will be issuing Centennial throwback Badges.

The Village of Schiller Park Centennial Year culminates in March 2014 with a gala dinner celebration. Many activities are planned and the fire department is a part of the process. Plans are for monthly events sponsored by the Village.

Our State Fire Marshal Fire/Arson Investigator Mitch Kuschner got a new partner May 1<sup>st</sup>. His canine partner Raider is being retired and his new partner Zoe a yellow lab will take over. Mitch will attend a one month

certification period in the Northeast to certify his dog.

IDOT has approved funding for the widening of Mannheim from Irving north to the Kennedy. This should begin this summer.

We are looking at getting voluntary compliance with numbering or lettering the stairways in our multi-story buildings. This would aid residents and firefighters in identifying the fire attack and evacuation stairways.

Another project is to identify which elevators our stretchers can be fit in by placing a Star of Life on the elevator(s) that we can get our stretcher into. A blue bar under the Star of Life will indicate that the stretcher can be fully vertical in the elevator.

## Tools / Equipment and Other FYI's

A number of items have been worked on this past month.

Items worked on and happenings around the firehouse this month include:

With the 3 year warranty about to expire at the end of last month on the paint on engine 5, Lt. Budnik requested that it be inspected by Pierce. They came out and said that some work would need to be done and the vehicle was sent to the shops for about \$11,000 worth of work at their expense. It has returned with a complete new paint job at no cost to the Village.

We also had Tower Ladder 5 return from its Global after t a hydraulic line for the outriggers blew.. Repairs were made at Global and it has returned to service.

The kussmaul auto ejuect for the shoreline on tower ladder 5 was

replaced in house by Tony C.

The 2013 hydrant and hose testing schedule has been posted. If there are any questions see Lt. Budnik.

A problem with our "W" tool has caused it to go back to the manufacturer. It was worked on at no cost under the warranty.

Lt. Budnik worked with our fire extinguisher vendor to have all of the Village extinguishers inspected and re-tagged.

We have taken possession of a new exhaust fan that is battery operated. It will be placed on Engine 5. It has a total run time of 20 minutes at full capacity. It can also be run off an extension cord if necessary. This replaces a fan that is more than 20 years old. We will evaluate its performance to see if the other fans at the end of their service life should be replaced with this type of fan.

We also replaced the retractable lanyard on our thermal imaging camera. The spring had broke on the attachment.

FF/PM Bertoncini has worked on several of our SCBA regulators and equipment and returned three back to service. These repairs saved money from being spent on outsourcing the repair. FF/PM Bertoncini will be attending a refresher class from MSA in Norwood Park later this summer for any updates.

Air One did come out to do the quarterly air testing on our air compressor. All samples taken met or exceeded standards set for breathing air for SCBA's.

## EMS Director's Briefs

Just an update on activities within the bureau...

We took delivery of the new ambulance 5 this past month. There will be a transition period to get it in service and inspected by all

appropriate agencies before going in service. The committee thanks everyone who worked on this project and reviewed, inspected and made suggestions.

EMS Week this year is May 19-25<sup>th</sup>. The theme of this year is "EMS, One Mission, One Team".

FF/PM LiRosi has taken over all of the CPR classes and instruction. He will coordinate both the private and the village sector. FF/PM Hudecek, Niemand, Bubis and PM Jenkins and Kosar are all still instructors helping out. We are averaging 3-4 classes per month with 50 plus students.

We have two Northwest Community Hospital paramedic students riding with us. They are currently assigned to riding on Red and Gold. They are in Phase I of their training and observing. They will move into Phase II where they will be active participants. The preceptors for Schiller Park are PM Jenkins, FF/PM Leiser, FF/PM Bubis, FF/PM Gergits and EMSD Nosek. The students will be with us until they complete Phase III. Good luck to these men and offer guidance when necessary.

When doing run sheets please verify that you have the correct incident number. All incident numbers from Schiller Park dispatch are seven digits. Also to help prevent the computers from overheating, leave the lid open.

Worldwide there continues to be a shortage of certain drugs that we administer. It may be impossible to exchange certain drugs at the hospital because of the shortage. I will be coming out with an FYI to inform you of any developments.

Please remember that any unused or empty controlled substance vials must be brought into the hospitals for them to replace. If you have any questions or concerns, please see EMSD Nosek.

Please consult the FYI's on the EMS Clipboard in the kitchen for complete info and updates.

## Other EMS bits...

Tony Calefati worked on repairing a 12 volt socket on Ambulance 6.

We also repaired an air shoreline that was leaking at the connection on ambulance 6.

A new blood pressure cuff replaced one on ambulance 6 that had a leaky bladder.

A new microphone was installed on the rear of old ambulance 5. Also the side step was repaired.

New Massimo SPO2 sensors were obtained. A spare will be kept in the EMS Director office.

We are looking at removing from service all the blue backboards and keeping in front line service the green combi ones. If needed, we can use the blue Iron Duck backboards as spares. If you have any questions consult with EMSD Nosek.

New Ambulance 5 had its knox box installed this past week. It will shortly have a rack installed in the cab for miscellaneous forms and books rather than strewn about on the floor of the cab.

We also replaced with new batteries both Dewalt cot batteries on our ambulances.

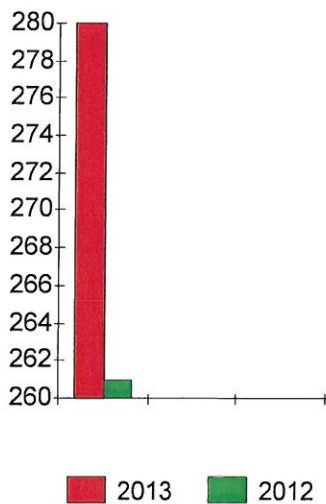

During the past month personnel responded to 88 emergency calls. A total of 92 patients were encountered. 72 patients were transported to area hospitals. 46 patients required Advanced Life Support care.

FF/PM Bertoncini has replaced the ceiling above the stairway leading to the second floor of the firehouse. The hall will be painted and new track lighting was added by Lou.

The former Westside overhead doors interior was dura-rocked and will be taped, mudded and painted soon.

We are looking at insulating the old entrance to the firehouse from the radio room to make it more sound proof.

A new garden hose was added to the rear outside of the firehouse this past month. It will allow for cleaning of tools and equipment outside of the firehouse.

We were also fortunate enough to have Ron Clement help with the rodding out of the kitchen sink and slop sink in the firehouse. This has prevented backing up of sewage.

Lt. Budnik and his Bureau have also embarked on the following projects—a new exhaust fan will be installed at the top of the stairway in the firehouse to help vent heat that comes up the stairs from the apparatus floor. Hopefully this will help remove the high heat and humidity that plagues us during the summer.

## Office of the State Fire Marshal and Training

### Failure to Train is Training to Fail

The training division has been active in defining and charting a course for our department.

Cmdr. Leiser and Cmdr. Chiodo attended the Training and Safety Officers meeting.

FF/Pm Leiser, FF/PM Swiontek, FF/PM Gergits, FF/PM Piculas all attended the Illinois Fire Service Institute Live Fire Training at the University of Illinois campus.

FF/PM Bertoncini attended the recertification on MSA air packs.

FF/PM Leiser and FF/PM Gergits attended the Fire Department Instructors Conference in Indianapolis.

FF/PM Hudecek completed the State of Illinois Lead EMS Instructor course.

We are in the process of co-hosting a Vehicle Machinery Operations class in September. It will be limited to 20

students and be held in Northlake.

I have received a DVD training simulator where we can use pictures of buildings in town and I will be able to set up different scenarios.

I am looking into the possibility of hosting some State Fire Marshal classes including technical rescue, vehicle machinery operations, and fire apparatus engineer. I will notify personnel if openings occur.

We will also have in the new future a Fire Service Vehicle Operator class (FSVO).

I have signed up several members for OSFM classes as part of their job requirements. If you know that you need a class please let me know, I will try to find one, however if you find one on your own please submit the paperwork and maintain a copy for yourself.

I have also obtained railroad ties for training in using different techniques for cutting, i.e. chopping with axes, mauls, saws. They are located behind the firehouse.

Members completed 235 hours of training for the month with 23 training drills. This includes outside classes. Our Paid on Call had 5 meetings for 28 hours.

The second Thursday of each month the State Fire Marshal has a testing site at Triton College. They have also instituted a new policy of a government issued picture ID at the test site. If you cannot produce one you will not be allowed in. Likewise they are requesting that all phones be left in the test takers car to help with the integrity of the test (too many camera phones). If you would like to sign up see Cmdr. Leiser.

Please fill an Outside Training Form whenever you attend a class, seminar or training session outside of Schiller Park. This allows for accurate record keeping in those areas and credit for the hours you put into training.

Signing up for tests is considered a Duty Assignment. If you can't attend see me in advance and provide a

written response for the absence.

## Employee of the Month

This month two members were nominated and acknowledge as our Employees of the Month—Cmdr. Maher and Lt. Budnik.

Cmdr. Maher was called out to the Des Plaines this past month when a dog appeared to be in distress. Cmdr. Maher brought out to the river a 12 foot pike pole and a net and was able to coax the dog from the water shoreline back to safety. Cmdr. Maher credits his actions as being inspired by the River Grove Fire Department and their dog rescue a few months back.

Our second employee Lt. Budnik saved the Village over \$11,000 when he was able to get our front running engine completely repainted at no cost to the Village.

For your commitment to our department we are honored to call you our Employee of the Month.

Thanks for your time and dedication, you make us proud to be firefighters and in the fire service and village employees.

## Fire Prevention

### *An Ounce of Prevention is Worth a Pound of Cure*

Shifts are working on their 2013 inspections. Each shift received 1/3 of the inspections or about 135 per shift. The inspections are rotated so that over a three year period each shift should have the opportunity to enter all the businesses. To date about 157 total inspections have been

completed.

We may soon see some development in the West Gateway area. A proposal for a parking garage is being presented to the Village.

Our Water Department has also requested that on any new or upgraded fire suppression system that the by-pass meter on the backflow protection be either a Neptune or Census water meter. These are compatible with our MXU system.

Please remember on emergency numbers forms to circle which shift the inspection is assigned to. That way it can go in the correct file and may save a re-inspection trip if that was all they required.

We also want to ensure that all PRE-PLAN sheets are returned and handed in to Cmdr. Maher or FF/PM Niemand. These are ESSENTIAL for us to try to complete our computer based pre-plan program. Cmdr. Maher will begin to strictly enforce the policy on completing these documents with possible disciplinary action for non-compliance. When you bring back your fire inspections, make a copy of the pre-plan forms and submit to FF/PM Niemand. He is CAD drawing the diagrams with the information. He is also using satellite imagery in each of the files. This process will take a year or more to import, drawn and download to our laptops. IT IS IMPORTANT TO COMPLETE THIS PAPERWORK AS IT IS PART OF THE PRE-PLAN THAT IS ISO NECESSARY.

I am reviewing several new businesses in town. We have several major projects that are in the works.

If you are interested in any plan review in Fire Prevention, please see me. I will review what is coming into town based on what plans Community Development sends over.

Any member wishing to attend the monthly meeting of the Illinois Fire Inspectors Association should contact Cmdr. Maher.

We are also suggesting and strongly

recommending that sprinkler and standpipe connections be converted to storz fittings. Please consult with Cmdr. Maher.

The State Fire Marshal is instituting a new certification program Inspector I. Cmdr. Leiser is looking into the program if this should replace the Fire Prevention Principles as required before third year of hire. Cmdr.'s Leiser and Maher will advise those needing the class when it is available.

I also plan on retiring in the near future. As such I am beginning a transition to my replacement Lt. Hatcher. I hope you support him as well or better than me. More to follow.

## Public Affairs

### *Saving Lives Through Education*

We have been very pro-active in Public Relations during the past month.

The Public Relations Bureau is working with the 100 Year Anniversary Committee for different activities throughout the year.

We are planning next school year and working with all the schools in Schiller Park. Next year each school will have a firefighter assigned as a liaison/representative to the school. They will coordinate all activities with that school and be a resource officer between the school and the fire department. The schools are excited and on board.

FF/PM LiRosi and FF/PM Werner participated in the School district outing to the Chicago Cubs on May 3<sup>rd</sup>.

As we are at the end of the school year we have attended a number of assemblies and programs in the schools. We have also been invited to a number of the school and grade graduations.

Other ideas being explored include our next Gyro fest, Citizen Fire academy, Jr. Fire Academy, Employee thank you.

FF/Pm LiRosi also continues to work in training and teaching CPR classes.

We are also coordinating with other a fire service organizations the implementation and publicizing the "ICE" program (In Case of Emergency) for people's cell phones.

## Retiree Row

FF Schuyler (ret.) is exploring a second career in the fire service. He is exploring working as a firefighter and mentor for another department in Division 20.

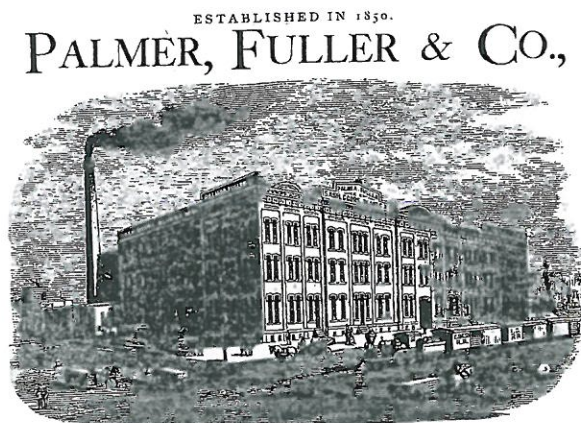

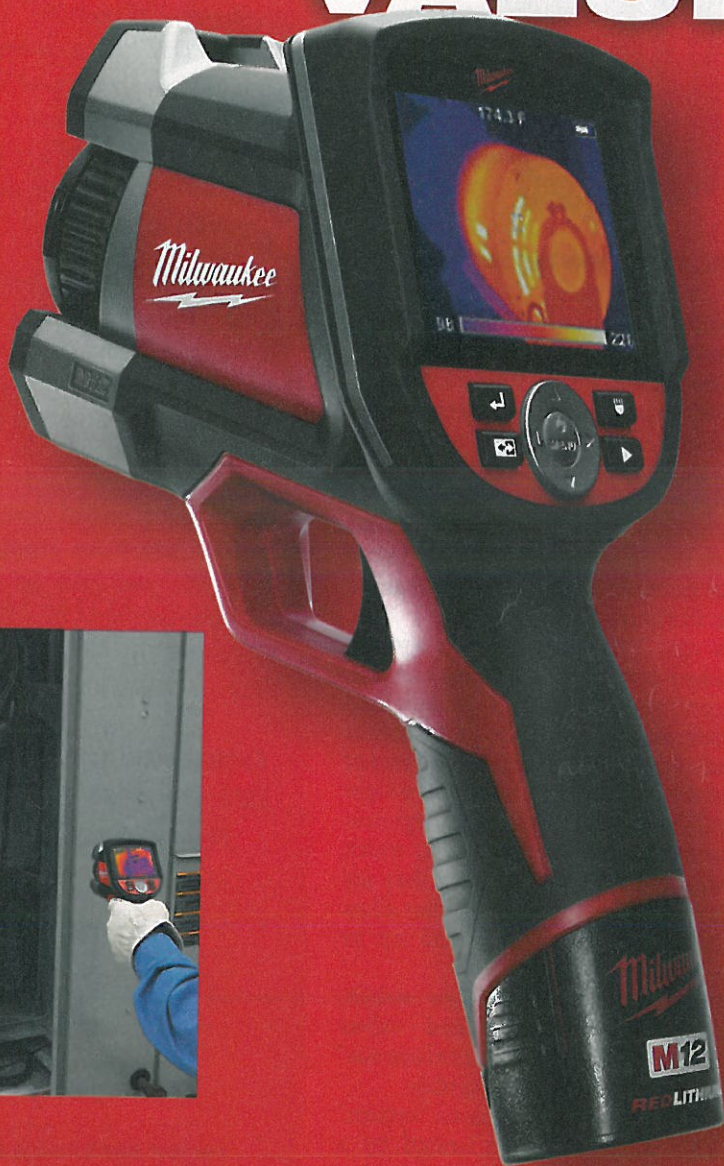
